

# WELCOME TO THE THIRD



Welcome to the third Borderlines Film Festival - it's the biggest and best yet with over 100 screenings of 60 films from 15 different countries. As in previous years The Courtyard will be the buzzing hub of the Festival. We will be showing the best British films of the year, some fascinating documentaries, and a selection of a dozen of the most beautiful and inspiring films from all around the world. Among the Festival highlights are a series of events on films, food, psychotherapy and Street Art in which directors and critics discuss the films being shown and the issues they raise.

Award-winning feature film & documentary director, Deborah Koons Garcia will be flying in from the States to introduce her film The Future of Food, a timely warning of the impact of modern farming methods on the food we eat and the health of our children. After the film Martin Orbach, Director of Abergavenny Food Festival, will chair a discussion of the issues raised by the film with among others, Reverend Nick Read, Agricultural Chaplain to the Bishop of Hereford.

We have a day devoted to Derek Jarman, one of the most original filmmakers Britain has ever produced. We will be screening two of his best films (Caravaggio & The Last of England), along with a screening of a documentary about Jarman's life and work that will be introduced by the director, Andrew Kimpton-Nye.

One of the great successes of last year's Festival was the River of Life screening of local films from times gone by and we are searching through archives across the country again to bring you another evening of long-lost gems.

For the first time we are showing a series of music films - Ray, White Stripes, Metallica, The Sound of Brazil - that are quaranteed to put a smile on your face, and each weekend we are also showing some children's films. Our selection of the very best films from around the world from Bhutan to Brazil, from Argentina to Russia features films that are as different and distinctive as the countries they come from.

In the Best of British strand the highlights include Mike Leigh's masterpiece Vera Drake, Enduring Love, a sensitive adaptation of Ian McEwan's novel, and three films from first time women directors A Way of Life, Dear Frankie, and Afterlife which show just how vibrant and diverse British cinema has become. All of these films feature fantastically good performances, and we are delighted to have the directors of all three coming to introduce their films.

You will all be glad to hear that we are doing the same this year and also offering a special Festival ticket for the main evening screenings of 5 films for £15!

I would like to thank all our partners - at The Courtyard, Disabilty Arts Shropshire, Flicks in the Sticks, Ludlow Assembly Rooms, and Presteigne Assembly Rooms - and their staff for their hard work in making this festival so wide-reaching and exciting. I believe there's something here for everyone to enjoy from the serious film fan to the first time visitor.


Racing Stripes (U)

Director: Frederik Du Chau

This is an ugly duckling story about Stripes, a zebra abandoned by the circus and adopted by a farmer and his daughter. Stripes grows up longing to race like the horses around him, so with the help of his barnyard friends he sets out to achieve his dream. Like Babe this mixes live action animals (& humans), computer generated effects and the occasional animated comedy creatures. This has a good story, an enjoyable script, and with some nice turns from the humans, provides plenty of laughter for both young and old.

### Friday 18 4,15pm & Sunday 20 6,30pm Angel on the Right (12A)



Starring: Maruf Pulodzoda, Uktamoi Miyasarova, Kova Tilavpur Tajikistan/Italy, 2003, 1 hour 29 minutes, subtitles.

Told with wit, wisdom and feeling, this is a hardedged black comedy that reveals a strange and contradictory world where Muslim and Russian cultures collide. A place controlled by brutal men, who praise the Prophet while getting hammered on vodka. Petty thug Hamro returns to his village to see his mother before she dies. He had fled to Russia 10 years before, but it's not long before the local mayor and a gang of heavies demand that he meet the debts he left behind. An uncompromising anti-hero who'd rather take a beating than change his ways, Hamro finds he has to care for the son he abandoned and fulfill his mother's final wish. Strongly influenced by the stark realism and dark humour of Iranian cinema, Angel on the Right (the first film from Tajikistan released in the UK), also boasts moments of metaphor, magic and surprising comedy that punctuate this knowing retelling of the parable of the prodigal son.

Vera Drake (12A)

A period piece from the drab, repressed '50s in which cheery charlady and secret abortionist Vera is the light of human kindness who is always helping her many friends and neighbours. The lynchpin of a respectable working class family to whom she is devoted, her help extends to those unfortunate girls 'in trouble'. Focusing closely on Vera's story and its repercussions for her family, the complexity of the moral issues and social inequities are keenly felt. Full of the sharp observations and the richness of the everyday that are Leigh's trademark, this is at first amusing, but finally heartbreaking, as Vera goes from cheery stoic to shamed, broken woman.



Like all the best documentaries this has, at its heart one delightfully simple, and very good idea. In 1999, actor and documentary filmmaker Jeremy Gilley had an idea to create a starting point for peace: a global day of cease-fire when all the guns would be silenced. For the next two years, he traveled the world, building his case for this day of peace and filming every step along the way. This is the fascinating record of his journey that has you yo-yoing back and forth from deep cynicism to great optimism - is the man a visionary or a fool? He met many key decision-makers and slowly succeeded in enlisting the support of some of the world's most influential figures - UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan, His Holiness The Dalai Lama, Shimon Peres. Then fate intervened.

Screening with two locally made films that deal with personal reactions to peace and war. *In Contempt of Conscience*, Joe Jenkins, a member of The Peace Tax 7 asks – are we not all conscripted through our taxes?

In 100,000 Red Squirrels, Ian Russell deals with the impact of the Iraq War on one man.

Directors Jeremy Gilley, Ian Russell & Joe Jenkins will be present to discuss their films.

A feud over land has caused generations of deaths for two Brazilian peasant families. Nothing it seems can break the cycle of violence. Now it is the turn of young Tonio to pick up a gun. A perfectly self-contained tragedy but with universal significance.

After the screening Mike Brearley will lead a discussion on the themes raised by the film.

A year later Dan fancies, pursues and eventually beds Anna (Roberts), an attractive photographer whose partner Larry (Owen), a cold-hearted macho doctor then seeks out Alice. After that things start to get complicated. Brutal, funny, and oh-so-cold-hearted, but all four stars are on top form as beautiful people who talk dirty and compete ruthlessly in a bitter dogfight for sexual dominance.

But best of all he starts hanging out with the quirky Sam (the magical Natalie Portman), a pathological liar who gradually reignites his love of life. Full of lovely lines and hilarious scenes this is an amusing portrait of a guy sleepwalking through life until he finds love.

### Metallica: Some Kind of Monster [15]

What happens when the wild men of rock get in touch with their inner child? This is a bullshit-free glimpse of Metallica, the world's most successful heavy metal band, when they get together to record a new album. But the competitive pressures that fuel both the musical creativity and the self-destructive behaviour have taken their toll. They can barely stand the sight of each other but all the time they are taking advice from a homely therapist paid \$40,000 a month to keep them together. Rich in black comedy (at times outdoing Spinal Tap), sometimes excruciating, it's like witnessing a car crash in slow motion - you just can't help but watch. Not just for fans, this is a real insight and great entertainment for anybody remotely interested in the billion-dollar rock machine of the popular music industry.

### Monday 21 8.30pm

### River of Life

We are delighted to announce the return of the River of Life archive screening. This was one of the most successful events at the Festival last year, with an evening screening at The Courtyard and as a series of shorts shown before the main feature at Flicks in the Sticks yenues.

Among the highlights were short films that took audiences straight back to Kington in the mid 1920s. Local cinema owner Mr Miller would on high days and holidays take his camera out on to the streets of Kington and then pull in audiences in the following week to see themselves on the big screen – much like the work of the Blackburn Edwardian film-makers Mitchell and Kenyon recently shown on the BBC. Thanks to Mr Miller we have preserved extraordinary feats from the Annual Sports Days. Who can forget the committed and dangerous tackling in the game of Motorcycle Football from 1926?


Now the search has begun for more films to show this year. Research is taking place in national and regional archives and in private hands looking for films from over 100 years of film-making. So far we have found films made in the 1910s on street life and fairs in the centre of Hereford by the celebrated Alfred Watkins, an early pioneer of cinematography; on traditional cider making in the 1930s; on world renowned steam trains and old branch lines from the 1950s; on the natural history of the River Lugg; and on the ancient art of making a traditional coracle using willow, hazel and cowhide. A full programme of screenings at The Courtyard and the shorts programme at Flicks in the Sticks venues will be published nearer to the Festival dates.



Silent Gems: Buster Keaton

Silent Gems

Gems of the Silent Screen with Paul Shallcross on the piano.

One of the highlights of last year's Festival was the screening of two Buster Keaton films with live piano accompaniment by Paul Shallcross. This year Paul, who composes his own scores for the films, will be returning with a fascinating programme of short films from the early days of silent cinema.

As well as showing familiar faces such as Laurel & Hardy in Big Business, (the most polished of their silents) and Buster Keaton in One Week (the film that catapulted him to international fame), we will also screen some less well-known gems (What It Feels Like To Be Run Over, Grandma's Looking Glass, Mary Jane's Mishap) that give an idea of the staple fare in British 'picture houses' one hundred years ago. Of particular interest are the films of the first Welsh filmmaker, William Haggar, who showed his films at fairgrounds throughout Wales. Perhaps more than any other surviving films, A Desperate Poaching Affray, The Life of Charles Peace and The Bather's Revenge, recreate the excitement and wonder of the early travelling cinemas. The evening's programme will also include Ghosts Before Breakfast, a surrealist vision of floating hats, manic legs, and disintegrating images, that was inspired by Magritte and which will be accompanied by a selection from Eric Satie's piano works.

In a deceptively loose, highly original way Altman deals with the enduring obsessions of American life (celebrity, sex and politics) and creates an immensely enjoyable film that truly deserves the much abused title, 'classic'.

Happy loving couple, Joe and Claire witness a freak balloon accident in which a man dies. This leads to a series of increasingly bizarre encounters with loser-come-Christian-stalker Jed. This is both a psychological thriller and a profound look at the meaning of love in the face of our own mortality that features tremendous performances from Ifans and man-of-the moment Craig who hits all the right notes in his panicky slide into paranoia and self-pity. 

One of Britain's most innovative and controversial filmmakers. Derek Jarman was a hugely talented painter, writer, set-designer and gardener. He fused a radical gueer sensibility with a love of artifice and a highly personal, fiercely independent vision of the possibilities of cinema. Avant-garde in method but largely nostalgic in temperament, he was a maverick whose films (Sebastiane, Jubilee, Edward II, Caravaggio, The Garden, The Tempest) intertwine art, politics and sex in highly poetic fashion. Illustrated with clips from across his career and interviews with key collaborators (including his inspirational muse Tilda Swinton), this is a revealing and insightful portrait of one of the most original filmmakers Britain has ever produced.

The director Andy Kimpton Nye will introduce the film and lead a discussion about Derek Jarman's career and films.

One of Jarman's most uncompromisingly personal and innovative films, this is a devastating vision of 80's Britain that seems both very much 'of its time' and still as relevant as ever with its fury at the deterioration of both the social fabric and the beautiful countryside of Britain. A tirade of images of war and urban decay are intercut with Jarman's own childhood home movies, creating a shocking, yet beautiful and poetic film that has a rare ability to envelop one in its swirling images and bleak comedy. All is filmed and linked abstractly without the glimmer of a plot or story line.

The exhilarating footage of crazy surfers riding awesome waves shows them as the original lifestyle rebels – living for the pleasure of the next big wave with no thoughts of a career.

Without a word of dialogue, this picture of village life is a smart exercise in undermining traditional forms of storytelling and definitely one of a kind. There's as much focus on the animal life - moles creeping along their tunnels, bees buzzing, lily of the valley growing in deep, dark woods - as there is the human. But beneath the apparent harmony of the idyllic village there lurks a sinister mystery that results in two funerals and a murder. Violence and death are all pervasive with human fatalities given no more prominence than those of worms and ants. The superb soundtrack suggests that the fierce pulse of nature is always ready to break through the mundane surface of events. Never has peasant life seemed both so idyllic and so dangerous. A weird and wonderful film that won't be everybody's cup of tea, but if you fancy something completely different, give it a try.



If you enjoyed The Return (one of the very best films from last year that is screening at Garway & Much Wenlock) don't miss this mysterious road movie that is in some ways even better. At first sight they appear very similar with their wry melancholic tone and their exploration of a fragile relationship between father and son as they travel through the Russian countryside, but the mood of Koktebel is more like that of a Russian fairytale than pitiless Greek myth. The pair tramp south relying on generous strangers and odd jobs for food. They end up roofing for an alcoholic hermit and then the father falls under the spell of a kindly doctor, but the boy is determined to finish their journey to the sea. Beautifully scripted, full of unusual imagery and quiet observation of looks and gestures evoking the character's hopes and dreams in a way that is genuinely poetic. Thoughtful, tender and often humorous, framed by haunting music, this is a magnificent achievement.


On the verge of a big break, hard-nosed journalist Kenny finds himself forced to reassess his life when he learns that his mother is dying and that he must take care of his sister Roberta who has Down's Syndrome. As always Kidd is excellent, but he's eclipsed by a superb performance from Down's Syndrome actress Paula Sage whose character drives both plot and humour. Whether putting Kenny in his place with bolshy comebacks or knowingly colluding with her mother to get benefits, Roberta comically challenges presumptions and provokes curiosity about the contradictions of Down's, Carefully avoiding any sentimentality, Peebles tells a poignant story with great wit and affection for the characters - a real delight.

A true poet of the cinema, Murnau's films still retain the ability to touch the heart and stimulate both mind and eye.






