

Deceptively simple yet well-rounded, this tale of an illegal abortion in communist Romania carries a tremendous wallop, delivering a rich exploration of character, friendship, responsibility and devotion under duress. It might sound grim but screen realism rarely captures a time and place so well, nor creates such excruciatingly tense drama from such everyday events as a birthday party or checking into a hotel. Totally convincing in every way, especially in the piercing performance of Marinca as the staunch friend who has to pay a high price for helping her dippy roommate.

In a wonderland populated by an array of superbly animated puppets, steaks crawl, rolls sprout nails and Alice (the only human in the film) not only shrinks but becomes her own doll. 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
City of Men (15)

It follows the fate of two best friends, both about to turn 18, Ace is trying to raise a son while Wallace is desperate to find his long-lost father. When gang warfare breaks out and past secrets surface their friendship is sorely tested.

Hugely engaging and quietly moving this starts off as a film about cinemas and becomes a film about life, love, dreams and the pursuit of happiness. At the age of 43, Bauby, the charismatic editor of French Vogue suffered a massive stroke that left him unable to communicate except through the blinking of his left eye. Painstakingly he told his story, his memoir became an international best seller that, like the film, avoids turning him into a tragic hero, but shows him as a flawed, droll, irreverently funny man. Grounded in a subtle and intelligent central performance, and by Bauby's own marvellous words, Schnabel excels at bringing the author's internal world to the screen through rich visual poetry.

This year one of our main features will be presentations by Oskar Bright, the first film festival to be led by learning disabled people, as it goes 'on the road'.

Featuring a selection of intriguing and very different shorts from disabled groups and film-makers from all around the UK. The Group of Gardeners from Arty Party's Telford based performance group hints at the stories that lurk just below the surface, how these stories bring us together, but also keep us apart. Murder at the Manor by National Deaf Children's Society in Northern Ireland is a five minute film rollercoaster of fun based on a Cluedo-style murder mystery with a modern twist, made by a group of deaf children. The martial arts action thriller Stranger Hero by Shoot Your Mouth Off, features the world's first kung-fu superhero with Down's Syndrome, designed to make young people think twice before dismissing disabled people.



Oska Bright is the first film festival anywhere in the world to be run by, and for, people with a learning disability. It is now four years old and is bigger and better than ever! Oska Bright 'on the road' will show a selection from the 2007 Oska Bright Film Festival. This includes an enormous, exciting and inspiring range of short films - films that will make you laugh until your sides hurt and other films that stretch your emotions the other way until you weep because you can't do anything else! There are documentaries, dramas, animations and dance films. all created by film makers with learning disabilities - a unique look at a cultural minority using film to express their diversity and power.
